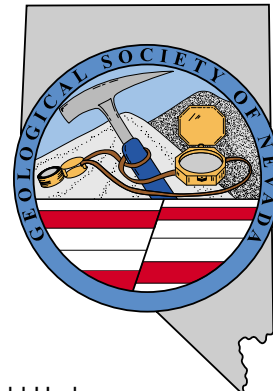

USGS on the late Cenozoic landscape evolution in northern Nevada. His research shows that mineral deposits in north-eastern Nevada, such as in the Carlin area, are being exhumed or eroded, whereas those in northwestern Nevada are being concealed. This kind of field oriented research has very practical applications to the exploration for mineral deposits and ground water in Nevada and should be continued within the USGS. Well done, Alan!

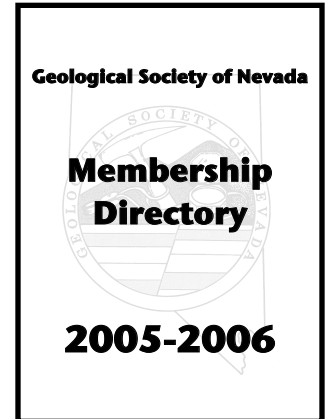

A BRIEF OVERVIEW OF THE HISTORY AND GEOLOGY OF THE COMSTOCK DISTRICT: 150 YEARS OF CHICANERY, EXUBERANCE, AND NAIVETÉ

Donald M. Hudson, Ph.D.

The Comstock district in Nevada is one of the most famous precious metal districts in the U.S. Great volumes of fiction, semi-fiction, and facts have been published in past sesquicentennial. A colorful history lies in the discovery and development of the district. Within the history of the Comstock lies many tall tales, the roots of mining law, the industrialization of mining, and the development of economic geology. The geologic story of the formation of this large epithermal district has had global impact on the understanding and misunderstanding of epithermal vein systems. The geologic interpretation of the district has evolved through successive workers that continues to this day.

Don Hudson was born and raised in New Jersey. After receiving his B.S. degree in geology from Marietta College in 1974, he came to Reno for graduate school and has never left the area. He received his M.S (1977) and Ph.D. (1983) degrees in economic geology from the University of Nevada-Reno. Don has worked for major and junior companies in mineral exploration for over 20 years in the Western United States and Central and South America primarily for low and high sulfidation epithermal precious metal deposits. As a consulting geologist since 1989, he provides petrographic and x-ray diffraction analysis services for a wide range of companies in mineral exploration, industrial minerals and geological engineering. Don's on-going research has focused on the famous Comstock Lode District, deciphering the geologic setting and ore deposits of the district.

GSN BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING

The GSN Board of Directors held its first meeting on November 19th and all Board members were in attendance. The majority of the meeting was taken up with organizing Board committees and reviewing the current status of GSN. The Board established the following six committees to conduct the main business of the Board: Nomination, Audit, Fiscal, Rules, Foundation, and Symposium. In addition, Richard DeLong was elected as Chair of the Board. The GSN Treasurer and the Chair of the GSN Foundation provided discussions of GSN and the Foundation finances. There were also general discussions concerning GSN operations, both present and past, giving the Board members a detailed understanding of GSN functions.

At the request of the Executive Committee and based on concerns expressed by some of GSN's Chapter leaders and members, the Board discussed the status of dues for GSN in general and specifically GSN Chapters. One issue identified is the fact that most years since 1994, GSN has lost money. The Board's discussions did not identify a clear consensus on significant expenses that could be eliminated, in order to make ends meet, without harming GSN's programs to foster the geological sciences. The other issue associated with dues is determining the best way to define membership in the GSN Chapters. The Fiscal Committee and an Ad Hoc group will be assessing these issues over the next few months and the Board will make a recommendation to the Executive Committee in the spring.

The Board set its quarterly meetings for February, May, August and November. The next meeting will be Saturday, February 18, 2006 in Reno. The Board would appreciate input from the Members of GSN on any of the issues under consideration by the Board.

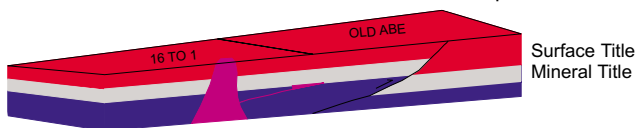

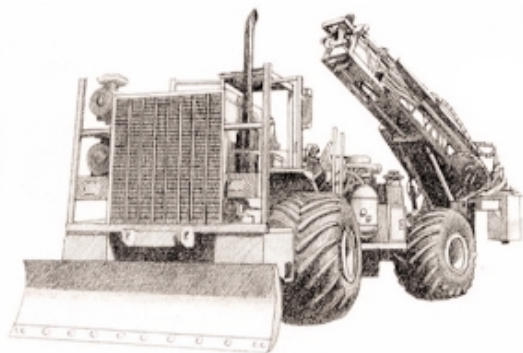

ABSTRACT

Rocks from the Sky: Nevada's Secret Meteorite Rush Norm Lehrman

After a slow start—only three known meteorites in the State's history through 1995—Nevada is fast becoming a boom state for meteorites. In the subsequent 10 years, upwards of 250 new visitors from space have been discovered! Taking place in remote and desolate playas, this "rush" is largely unknown to even the geologically-informed. This talk will cover Nevada's special favorability for meteorite discovery, as well as basic meteorite and impactite lore with an aim of training the audience to recognize and search for meteorites on their own. The talk will be presented on a relatively non-technical level, copiously illustrated with both photos and hand-samples, and a wide range of specimens will be available for purchase to help you calibrate your eye.

REFLECTIONS

Eric Seedorff's concern about the declining state of Economic Geology at our major universities was timely and provident, especially given the rise in commodity prices over the last year. Education is the key to reversing this trend, and the GSN/AIPG sponsored K-12 Earth Science Field Trip Grant program is a step in that reversal. Last year, teachers from 23 different Nevada schools led over 2000 students in 32 separate field trips, supported by the \$6,662.00 grant. Field trips included the Hazen diatomite mine, Spring Mountain Ranch Park, Red Rock Canyon, Nevada State Museum, Sand Mountain, Mono Lake, Mt Gilead, the William Keck museum and the Coloma gold mining education center, to name just a few. D.D. LaPointe, who serves on the GSN education committee, advises me that this year, there have been requests from 33 schools for grants. This program is certainly popular and the continued, demonstrable success of the program should attract a corporate sponsor when the three year commitment of AIPG funding expires.

On a different topic, most GSN members are aware that becoming a CPG member in the AIPG automatically qualifies that geologist as a Qualified Person (QP). On June 30, 2006, the AIPG will require all applicants after that to submit proof of continuing education. If you are thinking of joining AIPG, you may want to get your sponsors lined up and get your application in before that date.

The 16th annual AIPG Exploration Round Up is being held at the Holiday Inn in Reno on December 13 and to date, speakers from Bravo Resources, Miranda, Newmont, Agnico Eagle, AuEx, New West and Nevada Pacific have committed to do a presentation.
